A. Dale Lacky/CSEA Scholarship Winners Announced; Lok, Winton win Clarke Coover Scholarship Award

LODI (April 29, 2019) – The CIF Sac-Joquin Section is proud to announce \$26,350 in scholarships will be awarded to the 49 winners of the A. Dale Lacky/CSEA Scholarships for outstanding athletic performance, community service and academic success during their four years of high school.

The award, named after former Section and State CIF President, A. Dale Lacky, recognizes the top male and female student-athletes within the Section. The scholarship committee has selected four male and four female students as the recipients of an \$800 scholarship. The remaining nominees are awarded a \$450 scholarship from the Section.

In addition, the Clarke Coover Scholarship Award has been given to two of the top honorees. This award, named in honor of former Section Commissioner Clarke Coover, grants a \$1,200 scholarship to one male and one female. The 2019 winners of the Clarke Coover Scholarship Award are Pitman's Nolan Lok and Livingston's Annie Winton.

All schools were allowed to play one extra volleyball game and an extra boys and girls basketball game with 50 percent of the gate going directly to the foundation for the scholarships. More than \$18,000 was generated through the foundation games.

All of the winners will be recognized at the CIF Sac-Joquin Section Breakfast Awards Ceremony, which will take place on Tuesday, April 30, 2019 at Hutchins Street Square in Lodi. The program will start at 9 a.m. The Section will also be honoring three male and three female model coach winners at this breakfast as well.

The Clarke Coover Scholarship Award winners are:

CLARKE COOVER SCHOLARSHIP AWARD WINNERS (\$1,200)

NOLAN LOK (Pitman) – Nolan wrestled and swam for four years each, and he played football and water polo for two years each. In swimming, he was the team MVP twice and a Section qualifier three times. In wrestling, he won the Coaches Award twice. He's a member of Key Club, is the ASB Vice President and he's a chemistry peer tutor. Nolan won the Pitman Development Foundation MVP Award. He started the Pitman High blood drive and volunteers with the We Care Program, Turlock Shines, Love Turlock and Relay for Life. Nolan has a 4.59 GPA, which is No. 1

in his class of 499. He is undecided on his college choice, though he hopes to continue his swimming career while majoring in chemistry with a goal to become a chemical engineer.

ANNIE WINTON (Livingston) – Annie played golf, basketball and soccer for four years each, and she also played soccer her freshman year. In golf, she was named all-league four times, team MVP twice and she was the Trans-Valley League MVP this season. She was the team MVP in basketball three times, the league MVP twice and she was second in the state in scoring with 27.1 points per game. In softball, she was the team MVP once and an all-league selection twice. Annie is a member of leadership, CSF and was a student body officer for three years. She volunteers with the Livingston Recreation basketball and softball clinics, Knights of Columbus Fish Fry and Pancake Breakfast and as the Ballico School Dance DJ.
